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#### ADAPT Domestic Abuse Service receives funding from the following agencies/departments:

















Fund for European Aid to the Most Deprived (FEAD)

The FEAD programme is an EU-wide initiative to help support people take their first steps out of poverty and social exclusion. 85% of the funding comes from the EU with the balance of funding coming from the Irish Exchequer.

The Department of Social Protection is the Managing Authority for FEAD in Ireland

Our charity benefits from food assistance. The FEAD programme provides non-perishable food via their charity partners to families and individuals in need. Food supplied consist of breakfast cereals, rice, pasta and pasta sauce, soups, canned fish, jam, tea, coffee, sugar, and canned vegetables and fruit. The food items are easy to transport and store.

Our charity also benefits from material assistance under the FEAD Programme. The programme provides school stationary kits to children who are being supported by FEAD food assistance in both national and secondary schools.

#### CHAIRPERSON'S ADDRESS

Welcome to ADAPT Domestic Abuse Service's 2023 annual report. This year has been another year of opportunities and challenges for ADAPT, with increasing demand on our services, year after year.

In 2023, we developed our migrant outreach service, with a dedicated staff member join the team to respond to the needs of these communities and adjust our services accordingly. We are delighted to have this service in place and look forward to seeing its impact in the years to come.

This year our outreach development continued with more community organisations coming on board to help provide safe spaces where our staff can meet and support women throughout the City and County. Work continued on strengthening relationships with An Garda Síochána and the Courts Services, creating quicker and more consistent responses for women who need legal protection. A total of 638 women were supported through community outreach.

We continued to make improvements to the refuge this year. Places remain in high demand with challenges in transitioning residents out, mostly due to lack of safe, appropriate housing in the community. In 2023, there were 167 women admissions and 242 child admissions to the refuge.

The staff teams in ADAPT provide a high standard of support and safety for the women and children who avail of our services. These teams are supported by the Coordination Team and the Senior Management team who ensure that quality of practice and facilities stem from a trauma-informed framework. I would like to thank all of the staff in ADAPT. The services provided, in a considered, kind and proactive manner are, without a doubt life-saving for some of our service users. This is due to the dedication and professionalism of those who work in the service.

The ADAPT charity shop developed further this year. We are delighted to see the service it provides to the community as well as providing a source of income for the services of ADAPT. I want to extend our gratitude to the staff who makes this such a great charity shop.

2023 also saw a change in the officer's roles of the Board of Directors. Three new Board members joined us, Daire Ó Criodáin, Donnah Vuma and Orla Muldoon. We look forward to the ADAPT Board benefiting from their experience and insights.

To the existing Board of Directors, I'd like to take this opportunity to extend my sincere gratitude for your ongoing support and commitment to ADAPT.

I also wish to thank all of our funders for their continued support and who have assisted ADAPT in meeting some of the increased demands on service provision.

I also want to acknowledge the ongoing financial support and donations received from the many individuals, businesses, community groups and agencies. This financial support allows ADAPT to continue to provide quality vital services in the local community.

Finally, to all the women and children who availed of our services in 2023. We hope that we met all of your expectations and that you received the care and support you needed. It's our privilege to support you and thank you for trusting us.

#### DIRECTOR OF SERVICES STATEMENT

2023 was yet again another busy year for all of us here in ADAPT Domestic Abuse Services. Throughout the year we carried out essential refurbishment work in the refuge thanks to funding received from the Dormant Accounts Fund, Scaling Fund for Social Enterprises Strand 1. This included us being able to extend our refuge space from 14 self-contained apartments to 15 and to increase the size of one of our apartments from a bed-sit into a family sized apartment. As the demand for refuge space continued to increase in 2023, the move on for families from refuge remained problematic due to the worsening housing crisis. The addition of the extra apartment and the extension of a family room was well utilized but move-on from refuge for families into safe accommodation continues to be an issue.

In March 2023 we commenced our **Migrant Support Programme**. This programme forms part of our Community Outreach Service and specifically targets the women accommodated in the direct provision centres that are based in Limerick City and also women from the large migrant population living in the City. During 2023 a lot of work focused on working collaboratively with other agencies that support families in direct provision and from the migrant community in order to establish a trusted presence and point-of-contact. Later in the year we ran three 'Adapting for Wellness' Workshops for women from direct provision and migrant communities whereby ADAPT presented information alongside other local support services. This was funded by the Department of Children, Equality, Disability, Integration and Youth.

Another area that saw development in 2023 was our **Court Drop-In Support and Information Service** which is based in Merchant's Quay Courthouse in Limerick. The demand for this service has grown and we increased the service from a 2 days per week service to 3 days per week towards the end of 2023.

The end of 2023 also saw ADAPT running a 4 week Healthy Relationships Programme in Limerick Prison in conjunction with Bedford Row. This programme received extremely positive feedback from both the women prisoners and from prison staff. It is planned to continue this service into 2024.

During 2023 ADAPT supported 1,301 individual women and 166 individual children. This could not have been accomplished without the stellar work of the all the teams in ADAPT. I'd like to thank each and every one of our staff for their continued hard work, commitment and dedication in providing excellent support to the women and children that avail of our services. The work is complex and often challenging but our staff teams are tireless in their efforts to ensure that everyone who contacts us is offered the best support possible.

In 2023, ADAPT's core funding was received from the Child & Family Agency (TUSLA). We also receive funding to run our Childcare Service from the Department of Children, Equality, Disability, Integration and Youth via Pobal. Our core funding to run our Drop-In Court Support and Information Service and Court Accompaniment Service comes from the Department of Justice. We are extremely grateful to all our funders for their assistance in providing vital services for women and children.

As well as all our funders, I'd like to extend a huge thanks to the local community for the support we receive year in, year out. From members of the public who carry out fundraising on our behalf, to local corporates and small businesses that give so generously throughout the year – many thanks.

Finally, I'd like to thank our Board of Directors for their hard work, direction and support throughout 2023. To our Chairperson, Leonie Kerins, I'd like to thank you for the continued support and guidance provided to me and to the senior management team throughout the year.

#### ADAPT DOMESTIC ABUSE SERVICES—ABOUT US

ADAPT Domestic Abuse Services is a support service for women survivors of domestic abuse and their children. Located in Limerick City we provide a range of services including 24-hour helpline support; emergency refuge accommodation; outreach services; emotional and practical support for women and children. We also work with other agencies to enhance their understanding of domestic abuse and their capacity to recognise, respond and refer appropriately.

ALL OF OUR SERVICES ARE DELIVERED WITHIN A TRAUMA-INFORMED FRAMEWORK

#### **BOARD OF DIRECTORS:**

ADAPT Domestic Abuse Services is governed by a Board of Directors who come from a range of different backgrounds, specialisms and experiences. The Board are supported and informed by the Audit and Finance Committee, the HR Committee and the Governance Committee. The Board of Directors of ADAPT Domestic Abuse Services is committed to maintaining the highest standards of corporate governance and is in compliance with the Charities Governance Code.

The Board of Directors comprise the following: Leonie Kerins (Chair); Deirdre Moore, John Flanagan, Liam Carroll, Marie Woods. The Board of Directors met on the following dates during 2023: 15/02/23, 05/04/23, 31/05/23, 30/08/23, 31/10/23, 06/12/23 and the AGM was convened on 25/10/2023. The following Board members stepped down at the AGM in 2023: Leonie Kerins (re-elected) and Deirdre Moore (retired from Board). Daire Ó Criodáin, Orla Muldoon and Donnah Vuma were elected onto the Board at the AGM.

**AUDIT AND FINANCE COMMITTEE:** This Committee has oversight of the finances of the organisation on behalf of the Board. In 2023 the members were Leonie Kerins (Board member), and Therese Ross (co-opted to this Committee). Denise Dunne (Director of Services) and Jessica O'Sullivan and Kevin Taylor (Finance and Compliance Managers) attend meetings of this committee.

**HR COMMITTEE**: This Committee has oversight of HR matters on behalf of the Board. In 2023 the members were Mary Kenehan (co-opted to this Committee), Eileen O'Neill (co-opted to this Committee) and Marie Woods (Board member). Denise Dunne (Director of Services) attends meetings of this committee.

**GOVERNANCE COMMITTEE**: This Committee has oversight of compliance with the Charities Regulator and review of some of the governing policies of the organization. In 2023 the members were Leonie Kerins (Board member), John Flanagan (Board member). Denise Dunne (Director of Services); Claire Anderson (Asst. Director of Services) attend meetings of this committee.

**RISK MANAGEMENT**: Senior Management and the Board of Directors regularly review our Risk Register to ensure a high quality, safe environment for clients, staff, volunteers and visitors.

#### **Staffing Structure:**

During 2023 ADAPT's Senior Management Team comprised:

- ♣ Director of Services (Denise Dunne)
- ♣ Assistant Director of Services (Claire Anderson)
- Finance and Compliance Manager (Jessica O'Sullivan).

The Director of Services reports directly to the Board of Directors and provides reports to the Board in advance of Board meetings to ensure that it has full oversight of its governing responsibilities. Matters such as policy, strategic development, corporate governance and financial budgets are monitored by the Board.

In addition, ADAPT has 52 (21.8 WTE) core staff working across 6 departments. An additional 21 staff working directly for ADAPT are employed through the Community Employment Scheme and Job Initiative. These staff work in Property Services, ADAPT Charity Shop and Refuge teams.

ADAPT is also the Sponsor for an additional 13 CE positions across 6 other organisations namely:

Citizen's Information Services, Mid-West SIMON, Doras Lúimní, Headway, Self-Help Africa and Irish Cancer Society.



#### **ADAPT'S TEAMS**



#### **REFUGE SERVICE**

This team comprises 9 (6.18 WTE) core staff. Their focus is on addressing the needs of women who are seeking refuge and to provide support to women and children while they are living in the refuge and over the Helpline.



This team comprises 2 (1.84 WTE) core staff. Their focus is on prevention education, public awareness and training. This team also provide our T.E.D. Service (Training, Education and Development Service) by providing 1-2-1 coaching for women wishing to return to education or enter the workforce, Quality and Qualifications Ireland (QQI) accredited courses and Community Education courses.



#### **WOMEN'S SERVICES**

This team comprises 9 (7.32 WTE) core staff. Their focus is to provide support and advocacy for women who are resident in the refuge, those that attend outreach centres and Helpline callers. They also provide accompaniment to the various services including court. This team also facilitate the Drop-In Court and Information Service based in Merchant's Quay, Courthouse, Limerick



#### **CHILD AND YOUTH SUPPORT SERVICES**

This team comprises 9 (5.84 WTE) core staff). Their focus is supporting children and young people who have experienced domestic abuse/coercive control.

#### **ADAPT'S TEAMS**

#### ORGANISATIONAL SERVICES

This team comprises of 6 (4.96 WTE) core staff. They provide services to support ADAPT to function to the appropriate financial and compliance standards. These services include Finance, IT, Administration and Compliance.



#### **CHARITY SHOP**

This team comprises of 1 (0.92 WTE). The charity shops provides earned income to supplement ADAPT's activities and services. The charity shop also provides clothing and furniture for families that ADAPT supports.



#### **PROPERTY SERVICES**

This team comprises 4 (2.83 WTE) core staff. Their focus is on maintaining the upkeep of the refuge, offices, surrounding groups and transitional houses. They also maintain high health and safety standards related to the buildings and grounds.

#### **MIGRANT SUPPORT**

The team comprises 1 person (0.8 WTE). Our migrant support programme straddles both the Women's Services Team and the Training and Development Team. Migrant support provides one to one support and advocacy to Migrant women and women living in direct provision centres in Limerick. The Programme also involves raising awareness of domestic abuse to migrant support groups and groups of migrant women.

## MISSION, VISION AND VALUES

#### MISSION

The Mission of ADAPT is to offer support and safety to women and their children affected by domestic abuse. The service is committed to challenging domestic abuse by strengthening the capacity of individuals, communities and organisations to respond effectively and to change society so that domestic abuse is no longer tolerated.

The Vision of ADAPT is a world free from domestic abuse

#### **VALUES**

**Empowerment:** We value empowerment as an effective approach when supporting women affected by domestic abuse. This approach helps the women become stronger and more confident, especially in relation to making decisions that affect their lives.

**Respect**: We are committed to respecting the dignity of every individual that comes in contact with ADAPT including our service users, our staff, volunteers and external agencies.

**People-Centred**: We are committed to providing services that are responsive and relevant to each service user's unique needs. We actively listen to the voice of our service users and value their feedback.

**Equality:** We embrace the values of equality and diversity by treating staff, volunteers and service users with impartiality, inclusiveness, openness and fairness.

**Empathy:** We work with sensitivity and compassion so that we can better understand and respond to the needs of the women and children who seek our support.

**Non-Judgemental:** We believe that all our service users have the right not to be judged. We are committed to treating all service users the way we would want to be treated, regardless of their life circumstances, challenges and experiences.

**Teamwork**: We believe in working together in a spirit of solidarity and cooperation where staff and management all contribute to the development of the service.

## 2023 - YEAR IN REVIEW

## Refuge Services

The housing crisis continued to have an impact on women/families being able to move on from refuge into alternative, safe accommodation. Funding received from the Dormant Account Funding (under the Social Enterprise Strand) allowed us to open an additional one-bed apartment and reconfigure an existing bed-sit into a family sized apartment. Under this strand of funding we were also able to carry out the following essential works in the building:

- New disability wet-room installed in disability apartment.
- New disability shower installed in Disability Bathroom.
- Flooring for several areas of the building.
- New boiler for Property Services building.
- Additional security measures installed.
- Electricity shut off mechanisms installed in all apartments.
- Thermostatically controlled taps installed in all apartments.
- Fire safety door openers installed in all apartments.

Admissions to refuge – 167 women and 242 children

#### Residents' Activities

During 2023 residents' activities were organised to run in the refuge. These included beauty, fitness, arts and crafts and breathwork. These activities allow the women to come together, relax and have some fun!

"I just wanted to hand over some feedback from a resident who had her hair done by our volunteer yesterday. The resident said that the whole experience made her feel like a person again, not just the hair cut but having coffee and a chat and knowing that the volunteer gave up her time for her - she said it was the first time in months she has felt genuinely happy and not just pretending to be happy. She said it not only boosted her mood but also her confidence. She cried while talking about it and couldn't stop expressing how much it meant to her and how grateful she was". (Refuge worker)



## **Community Outreach Services**

In order to make our services more accessible we expanded our community outreach service throughout Limerick City and County. Focused awareness raising took place in the following areas where local community venues are now available to meet with women:

<u>Limerick City</u>: <u>Limerick County</u>:

- John's Street - Hospital - Newcastlewest - Kilmallock - Patrickswell - St. Mary's Park - Rathkeale - Croom - Castleconnell - Abbeyfeale

- Southill - Ballingeary - Murroe - Cappamore

An in-reach service in Coolmine Mid-West Addiction Services was also developed in 2023.

## **Migrant Support Programme**

A migrant support worker was recruited in March 2023 to support migrant women living in Limerick City and women living in direct provision centres. The support worker works closely with the other migrant support services in Limerick and attends multi-agency clinics in Knocklisheen Direct Provision Centre, the Travel Lodge (designated direct provision centre) and in the Clayton Hotel which covers the Dock Road area of Limerick.

Later in the year we received funding from the Department of Children, Equality, Disability, Integration and Youth to run 3 wellbeing workshops for IPAs and migrant women during November and December, in collaboration with Mental Health Ireland, Doras Luimní, LCETB and ABC Startrite.

26 women were supported through the Migrant Support Programme in 2023



## Limerick Prison - Healthy Relationships Programme

In October 2023, a four week Healthy Relationships Programme was ran in Limerick Prison for female prisoners in conjunction with Bedford Row Project. Due to the positive feedback received from the women who participated we will be running another programme in 2024.

Feedback from a prison officer in Limerick prison:

Just a little feedback from what I can see as a prison officer working with these ladies for years (around 15yrs!). The girls are very invested in the course and are really getting a lot from it. It is triggering lots for them and I have noticed there are girls that are opening up and crying out for help that would never have done this before. This is amazing because I believe they are in a great place to start dealing with their issues/emotions. They are in a safe environment and they have time to process what is going on. They are so hungry for help, support and guidance and this course (especially the facilitators) are providing all of the above. I believe it is breaking down barriers that may never have been attempted in a lifetime otherwise. The impact of this course is massive and I think there will be some hugely positive results from it. This will change lives."

## Court Drop-In Information and Support Service/Court Accompaniment

2023 saw a big increase in the amount of women availing of the Drop-In Court Support Service in Merchant's Quay Courthouse. 174 individual women availed of this service in 2023 compared to 45 in 2022.

534 court accompaniments were provided in Merchant's Quay, Mulgrave St., Newcastlewest and Kilmallock Courts to 281 women.

## **Support Groups**

In addition to the one-to-one support that ADAPT provides, we also run support groups for women. Support groups allow women to share their experiences with other women in similar situations and to gain support from each other. The groups are facilitated by two trained facilitators who support the women to understand and process the traumatic impact that domestic abuse has had on them.

14 women participated in the two Reaching Out Support Groups and 8 women participated in the Let's Talk Support Group that ran in 2023. 8 women participated in the Let's Talk Support Group



#### Research

Some of the participants in the support groups are participating in a University of Limerick European research project entitled 'Examining the efficacy of a peer support group, and associated group-based factors, for psychological and physical well-being'. The project aims to examine the value of support groups, what works, what doesn't work and how this might influence participants' well-being and physical health.



## **Child and Youth Support Services**

Our support work starts by providing initial support to families as a unit when they first come into refuge or if they access support through outreach services. When we support the family as a unit this allows us to get to know them and help to regulate and transition them into the service by designated staff. In 2023 we supported **166 children and young people** in this programme with **679 sessions** in total. At times the mother would be part of the session to help children to feel secure with staff and environment. Once the children feel more regulated and secure then they are moved into mixed groups programmes.



#### **Baby support sessions**

**15 babies** were given one on one support sessions and **226 sessions** were completed. One child has attended 118 sessions. Mums were part of some of the sessions at the beginning of the engagement. At present we aim to give babies one adult to one child so that babies can get physical and emotional assurance from staff. This age group requires high physical touch contact for their development.

#### **Early Years Club**

This is a 3-hour programme 9:30am to 12:30pm – five mornings a week. It is similar to ECCE programmes in other childcare services. **15 children** progressed into this group and there was **192 days completed**. This programme is underpinned by Aistear principles. There is a theme for the week that the play is focused around e.g. mindfulness, winter, pets, family cooking, under the sea, etc. Children develop skills in a group setting such as social skills, curiosity, learning to take turns, developing independence, building relationships with peers.

#### Afterschool programme

This is for 6 years upwards and is an afternoon programme 3-5pm.

**13 children** engaged in this programme and **149 sessions** were completed. The theme of the sessions includes homework support, mindfulness, cooking, arts & crafts and other play-based activities.



### **Youth Support**

**31 children** from age 10 years have engaged. **117 sessions** occurred. This was a combination of the Monday and Tuesday Youth Club (5-7pm), Friday Chill Out Café (3-5pm) and one-to-one youth engagement. Activities include a combination of UNO, cooking, Xbox, films and quizzes. Conversations with young people in these groups can be about family life and relationships and how they are experiencing school or refuge life.

#### **Creative Therapy Services**

**13 children** availed of this service – **90 sessions** completed. The therapist is on site one day a week and sessions run throughout the day. Referrals come from TLC Kidz Programme, ADAPT Outreach Service, ADAPT Migrant Support Service, the Gardaí and Túsla.

#### **Mother and Toddler Sessions**

#### 10 mums and 10 children participated. 29 sessions completed.

Two staff support this programme which runs every Tuesday morning. Themes of the sessions can be about self-care for mum and children, infant mental health, impact of domestic abuse on the family. But mostly it is about mums and children getting positive interactions and reassurance from staff



#### **DATS (Domestic abuse Teens Support)**

**3 young people from 12 years upwards participated in the DATs Programme. 45 sessions completed**. All participants were female for 2023.

Themes of the sessions are Healthy Relationships, Coercive Control, How I Feel about my Family, Court Expectations. Two of the participants have engaged in the national project Empower Me Project and one participant shared insight that led to developing the national children's power and control wheel.

#### **TLC Kidz Programme**

7 referrals were made from ADAPT to the TLC Kidz Programme.

Two programmes ran in ADAPT with Barnardos and ADAPT staff co-facilitating. One group was for 10-13 years old and one group was 6-8 years old.

#### **Child & Youth Outreach Programme**

**25 mothers** were supported in an outreach capacity by Child & Youth key workers. This connection was a combination of phone, face to face and text support. Themes of this support included how to deal with children before and after access and supporting mums to parent post separation.

#### **Healthy Relationships Programmes**

5 Healthy Relationships Programmes were completed during 2023 with a total of 152 participants.

## Training, Education and Development Service

#### TED Service aims to:



Empower participants/learners to develop their own social networks which leads to increased connections and social supports. By engaging in the TED Services participants/learners will have the opportunity to safely

re-engage with and participate in their communities which all leads to increased positive social, civic and health outcomes.

Additionally, we aim to assist people to develop/improve their overall confidence, communication and social skills by supporting them to learn new skills, improve their education.

During 2023 ADAPT ran the following:

- 2 QQI Classes and 2 non-accredited courses with a total of 23 participants.
- 7 women availed of 35 one-to-one coaching sessions.
- 6 personal development workshops were ran with 36 participants.




#### **GO PURPLE DAY**

#### 16 Days of Action (25<sup>th</sup> November – 10<sup>th</sup> December):



For the 16 Days of Action we produced a 4 minute video entitled 'Beyond Dreams' which records different people from different walks of life saying what the 16 Days means to them. It includes contributions from celebrities, people working in ADAPT, the Gardai and other community partners. This was launched on social media during the 16 Days and received a lot of attention.





#### Beyond Dreams Feedback:

- "This piece is so impactful and it is felt far and wide..."
- "I think we need to talk about these issues, publicly, and.. not let them get swept under the carpet."....
- "This year is my first year that I came to know about the 16 Days of Activism Campaign thanks to Women's Aid and Safe Ireland. Today is the day I came across this powerful piece from ADAPT Domestic Abuse Services".
- "To hear Irish voices say all the above (and more) this time of year, 8 days before the anniversary of a particularly painful experience, behind a particular closed front door, in a particular Irish village.... is beyond healing".
- "Love is not power over someone. Love is not control. Compassion is having the understanding that childhood traumatic experiences are often the predisposing factors for others adopting this mode of relating with others. Empathy is easing the door open for allowing others to see— to help— what is going on behind, and forgiveness is leaving the door propped wide open for healing conversations to begin".
- "There is an incredible amount of love for women radiating from this piece— for everyone experiencing the effects of abuse— and the sheer amount of time, effort, and vulnerability to record and release something so accurate and so visible is not lost on this person here.... and from across the ocean and from the bottom of her heart, you have someone who deeply thanks you for it.


## **Charity Shop**


The ADAPT Charity Shop is located in Parnell Street close to the Railway Station. The charity shop provides essential income to help run the services that ADAPT provides and in 2023 the Charity Shop performed well with a generated income of €182,669. The shop interior is spaced over two floors and sells everything from vintage furniture and fashion to toys and bric-a-brac.





During 2023 ADAPT received €2,539,023 in public funding. We used this funding to develop and deliver a range of service for women and children. A further €117,263 was raised through various donations/fundraising €59,255 was raised through other income generating activities including other non state funding.







## **Expenditure**

Our total expenditure for the year was €2,773,940. The breakdown of expenditure is detailed in the chart below. Of this 77% was spent on service provision including prevention and public awareness. In 2023 €2,672,127 (2022: €2,334,338) of costs arising from charitable activities were restricted.
